

TIRIMOANA SCHOOL

SUN SAFETY POLICY

RATIONALE:

This school recognises the high incidence of melanoma in the New Zealand population and that overexposure to the sun during childhood is a significant cause. The effects of over-exposure can be minimised by developing a sun safety policy as part of the school's requirements to provide a safe physical and emotional environment for students.

PURPOSES:

- 1. To increase student and community awareness of melanoma and provide practical ways of protecting skin.
- 2. To develop strategies encouraging responsible decision making about skin protection.
- 3. To develop a safe school environment which provides shade for students and staff.
- 4. To encourage students and staff to wear protective clothing, hats and sunscreen for high-risk times such as sport, lunchtimes, camps and trips.

GUIDELINES:

- 1. Parents will be required to purchase a school sun hat.
- 2. Children will wear the compulsory school hat when outside after 10am during terms 1 and 4.
- 3. Children not wearing a hat are required to play in allocated shade areas.
- 4. The school uniform, with sleeves and collars, provides protection from the sun. Parents will be reminded about the benefits of wearing similarly protective clothing on non-uniform days during terms 1 and 4.
- 5. Parents will be encouraged to provide sunscreen (SPF 30+) for their children.
- 6. Parents will be given information about the school's sun safety policy by way of newsletters.
- 7. Sunscreen (SPF 30+) will be available at the office for children's use before going out into the sun.
- 8. During terms 1 and 4, PE, sports and other outdoor events/activities will be timetabled in the morning or will take place under the canopy.
- 9. The school will develop shade areas by planting shade trees and constructing sunshade areas.
- 10. Teachers will include lessons on sun safety each year as part of the Health and PE curriculum.
- 11. The school will recognise Daffodil Day annually to promote awareness of melanoma and other cancers.
- 12. All staff and students will be informed of the Sun Safety policy and its intended practices.
- 13. Staff are encouraged to act as role models by practicing SunSmart behaviours.
- 14. The sun protection policy is reflected in the planning of all outdoor events (e.g. camps, excursions, sporting events).

CONCLUSION:

Active and responsible initiatives to promote sun safety awareness will assist in protecting students and staff from over-exposure to the sun.
